ANNUAL REPORT FINANCIAL YEAR 2008-2009



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Vision, Mission and Objects

1.1 Vision

The Australian College of Children & Young Peoples' Nurses will promote excellence in health care for children and young people in the context of their family and the community.

1.2 Mission

The Australian College of Children & Young Peoples' Nurses will advocate for and facilitate the continuing development of specialty nursing practices to meet the unique needs of children and young people.

1.3 Objects

- 1.3.1 The Company's principal objects in respect to children and young people between the ages of 0 18 are to:
 - 1.3.1.1 Advocate for:
 - (a) the inclusion of children and young people's health needs and issues in nurse education programs;
 - (b) excellence in the nursing care of children and young people; and
 - (c) a commitment at the political level to provide effective health services for children and young people.
 - 1.3.1.2 Facilitate the:
 - (a) professional development of nurses working with children and young people;
 - (b) development and maintenance of professional networks associated with nurses who care for children and young people; and
 - (c) implementation of programs designed to provide effective health services for children and young people.
 - 1.3.1.3 Influence policy, procedures and practices in organisations and government departments in respect to children and young people's health needs.
 - 1.3.1.4 Support, promote and participate in research associated with children and young people.
 - 1.3.1.5 Promote evidence-based practice through education and research and by providing education and research grants.
- **1.3.2** The ancillary objects of the Company which support the principal objects are to:
 - 1.3.2.1 educate nurses about children and young people's health needs.
 - 1.3.2.2 provide resources to facilitate the provision of education in respect to children and young people's health needs.
 - 1.3.2.3 raise community awareness of children and young people's health needs.



1.3.2.4 make known and further the Company's activities and principal obiects. 1.3.2.5 act as a lobby group as and when required by Members and to lobby for and on behalf of Members with the aim of changing legislation at all levels of government in Australia to include children and young people's health needs and issues in nurse education programs. 1.3.2.6 seek the co-operation of and join with like Associations, governments, corporations, health professionals and/or other persons to further the Company's principal objects. 1.3.2.7 undertake all manner of charitable work to further the Company's objects and to accept any specific or general gifts or bequests for such charitable purposes, whether conditional or not. conduct fund raising campaigns or other fund raising, marketing or 1.3.2.8 promotional activities. 1.3.2.9 raise money to further the aims of the Company and to secure sufficient funds for the purposes of the Company. 1.3.2.10 receive any funds and to distribute these funds in a manner that best attains the objects of the Company. 1.3.2.11 do all such things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of all or any of the objects of the Company. 1.3.2.12 actively participate in processes to regulate the speciality of nursing practice.



Chairperson's Report

It is with pleasure I present the Annual Chairman's Report for 2008-2009 for the Australian College of Children and Young People's Nurses

The ACCYPN was created in September 2008. The College was created from the amalgamation of five State associations and one National Association. The concept of a College was first discussed over a decade ago and I acknowledge the work of previous ACPCHN Committees in preparing the groundwork for the creation of a College. Work commenced in earnest in May 2006 and the College was created in September 2008.

The College has been registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee. This brings with it much stricter reporting requirements than an Association.

Membership

As of 30 June 2009 there were 586 members.

Associate members 12 Life Members 10 Ordinary Members 564

Governance

Under the Constitution the existing ACPCHN Committee members translated to being Directors of ACCYPN. The Directors will hold these positions for the first two years. This was written into the Constitution to ensure some stability as the College developed. In the first year, three of the Directors have resigned and Casual Appointments to the vacant Directors Positions will occur at the AGM.

In this first year, five States and one National Association have been closed and funds transferred to ACCYPN. This process is nearly complete. This has taken a considerable amount of work by a few members. Many thanks to those that made this happen.

Activities

The following activities have been undertaken since September 2008:

- The Constitution was developed and endorsed
- The Company was registered with Australian Securities and Investment Commission as a company without guarantee
- A new logo and image created to reflect the population of children and young people
- A new website has been created http://www.accypn.org.au/
 - o The website supports the registration of new members and payment online
 - The website is a key communication tool for ACCYPN
- The Board has developed a number of Business Rules to support the governance of the College (See Members section of the website)
- The Board held a two day planning weekend in March 2009 and developed a Business Improvement Plan and Strategic Plan (See Members section of the website)
- A Communication Plan was developed to inform key stakeholders of the creation of the College. There were 234 organisations contacted and advised of the creation of the College
- A bi-monthly newsletter has been published and I acknowledge the work of Marie Land as newsletter editor and for ensuring the newsletter is produced on time.
- The States have commenced creating State Chapters (watch the website for Chapter news)
- The Board has supported the creation of five Special Interest Networks. The first has been created (Child Health). Again, watch the website for notification of the other four



- Board members represent the College on the Journal Management Board, Coalition of National Nursing Organisation, the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Young People and the Starlight Foundation
- The Board invited the Governor General to be patron of ACCYPN and Her Excellency Ms Quentin Bryce AC, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia has accepted the invitation to be Patron of ACCYPN

Advocacy

College members participated in the development of the "National Standards for the Care of Children and Adolescents in Health Services". This was led by the Royal Australian College of Physicians and a number of key organisations were also involved. The Standards were launched in November 2008.

Journal

A new agreement with Cambridge (the publishers of the Journal) has been signed off as well as a new agreement with the Associations who manage the Journal. The Journal will become electronic as of the November 2009 issue. I would like to acknowledge the work of the members on the Journal Management Board in achieving these outcomes.

Conference

It was with regret that the Board made the decision to cancel the 11th Paediatric and Child Health Nursing Conference set down for May 2010 in Tasmania. The decision was made because of financial reasons due to the economic crisis. The Board will monitor the situation and will plan for another Conference once the situation starts to improve.

I would thank all the Directors for their contribution and in particular, Ms Judy Perrin in her role of Company Secretary. It has been a busy first year, and one where we have all been learning about managing a Company compared to an Association.

My vision is that 2009-2010 will provide opportunity for the College to grow and prosper. I believe we need to work towards becoming the peak organisation for Children and Young People's Nurses in Australia. This can only be achieved with the support of all the members.

Treasurer/Company Secretary's Report

As Jan has stated this has been a busy year. Since establishing the College (ACCYPN) in September, 2008 we have been consistently coming to grips with the requirements for running a Company.

The establishment of the College has required considerable expenditure over the year.

Website

There was much consideration given to how the College would 'brand' itself to reflect the diversity of settings in which nurses provide care for children and their families and also reflect the broad age range of the children and young people for whom we care. I think the website and our logo has done this.

The website also provides easy access for new and existing members to pay their yearly membership. It provides the opportunity for members to share their knowledge and experiences by subscribing to the list serve facility. One group was established prior to 30th June and up to five groups will be established in the future.

Marketing

The success and ongoing development of the College will only be achieved by maintaining and increasing membership. The Strategic Plan reflects our goals in terms of increasing membership. To date the marketing strategy has been to increase awareness of the College and the member benefits. Some marketing materials have been produced and circulated to all states and territories. The ongoing support of members is vital to enhancing the profile of the College amongst your colleagues. The College will continue to explore strategies to increase membership into the future.

Scholarships

The College provides a number of grants as shown on the website. The monies for these grants resulted from the transfer of funds from the previous national organisation (ACPCHN) and also from the state branches of ACPCHN who transferred funds as state branches were wound up. The funds have been placed in a Term Deposit and it is the interest from these funds which will provide the monies for the various grants. As all members would be aware with the economic downturn the amount of interest earned is very significantly less than in former years which may ultimately affect the number of grants available in the near future.

Operational Management

There are considerable financial reporting requirements associated with running a Company. This has resulted in a significant increase in operational costs over the year which were not anticipated when the initial budget was developed. It is anticipated that these costs will decrease somewhat in the coming year as considerable time and effort has been put into developing processes to streamline operational activities to ensure all reporting requirements can be met.

2008 Financial Result

The approved budget for the nine months September, 2008 to June 30th 2009, was geared towards the cost of setting up the College and providing some increase in benefits to members over and above those received from the former organisation (ACPCHN)



The initial operating funds were obtained from transfer of monies from the former national organisation (ACPCHN). Each state branch of ACPCHN also paid the membership fee of all members transferred to the College. These monies went directly to the operational funds of the College.

The 2008/2009 end of year result was a modest profit (loss) of \$5621.00

All members will be notified via email when the Annual Report including the Auditors Report is available on the website.

Outlook

With the current economic downturn, retaining and increasing membership will continue to be a challenge. It is hoped however that nurses whose state award provide additional monies for Professional Development will consider using some of that money for College membership. The College will continue to pursue the goal of becoming the peak professional body and voice for nurses who work with/for children and young people in whatever setting and also continue to advocate for Children and young people and their families.

I would like to acknowledge the significant contribution made by our Secretariat, Martin Bishop in this very busy first year of the College. Martin has provided invaluable advice and assistance to the Directors throughout the year.

I would also like to thank Jan Pratt for her ongoing support of myself and acknowledge her leadership and vision which has enabled us (the Directors) to achieve what we have in a relatively short time frame.

Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001*. The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity.

The Australian College of Children and Young People's Nurses is a company limited by guarantee.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corpoations Act 2001 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified, where, applicable, by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

a. Income Tax

The directors have self-assessed in accordance with Australian Taxation Office requirements that the organisation is exempt from income tax.

b. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amount.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their useful lives to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates for each class of depreciable assets are:

Depreciation Rate 20 to 40%

c. Financial Assets

Recognition

Financial assets are initially measured at cost on trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the related contractual rights or obligations exist.

d. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

e. Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

f. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

g. Comparatives

No comparative figures exist due to the entity commencing operations during the period

h. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the group.

i. New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued new, revised and amended Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods and which the company has decided not to early adopt. A discussion of those future requirements and their impact on the company is as follows:

AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 2007–8: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 101, and AASB 2007–10: Further Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 101 (all applicable to annual reporting periods commencing from 1 January 2009). The revised AASB 101 and amendments supersede the previous AASB 101 and redefine the composition of financial statements including the inclusion of a statement of comprehensive income. There will be no measurement or recognition impact on the company.
