Chairperson's Letter

Dear Members,

Welcome to the last edition of Communiqué for 2017.

Recently I had the opportunity and privilege to attend the 3rd Asia Pacific Paediatric Nursing Conference in Bangkok Thailand 21-23 November (for full report see inside this newsletter). It was an honour to represent ACCYPN as an invited speaker and to share and learn together.

ACCYPN is a member association of the Asia Pacific Paediatric Nurses Association (APPNA) along with the Hong Kong Pediatric Nurses Association, Pediatric Nurses Association of Thailand, Japanese Society of Child Health Nursing, Australian College of Children and Young People's Nurses, Pediatric and Neonatal Chapter under Singapore Nurses Association, Mother and Child Nurses Association of the Philippines, and the Paediatric Nurses Association of Indonesia.

What struck me, listening to the speakers from across many of the AP nations, is their common focus on the child and young person and advocacy for partnering with families. There is a commitment to addressing aspects of care across the health care continuum with a strong emphasis on primary health care and priority focus on pre-conception care, parenting, breastfeeding, immunisation and prevention of infectious diseases. It was also an opportunity to visit Thailand's largest hospital – Siriraj Hospital - hosted by the Hospital Nursing Executive team and paediatric nurses. The hospital has 2,500 beds, 72 operating theatres and sees 3 million outpatient occasions of service each year. The Paediatric units include critical care (PICU, CICU and RICU), oncology, rehabilitation, medical, surgical, and outpatients. The Paediatric outpatients department sees 300 children/adolescents per day.

Back in Australia, The AGM was held recently and you can read the ACCYPN Annual Report here <http://www.accypn.org.au/about-us/>. We welcomed new Directors to the Board – Dr Mandie Foster (WA) and Tara Flemington (NSW) and renewing director June Colgrave. We farewelled outgoing Director Scott Stokes (WA), and acknowledged the retirement from ACCYPN of Michelle Howard – a long-standing ACCYPN member and previous Company Secretary. 3rd Asia-Pacific Paediatric Nursing Conference 2017

Asia Pacific Paediatric Nurses Association hosted by the Paediatric Nurses Association of Thailand, Bangkok, Thailand, November 21-23, 2017

It was an honour to represent ACCYPN as an invited speaker to attend this conference in November.

The APPNA is an international association committed to improve the professional development of nurses, information resource sharing and promote children's health. APPNA was established in 2012 and has 6 members in the Asia Pacific Region - Hong Kong Paediatric Nurses Association, Paediatric Nurses Association of Thailand, Japanese Society of Child Health Nursing, Australian College of Children and Young People's Nurses, Paediatric and Neonatal Chapter under Singapore Nurses Association, and Mother and Child Nurses Association of the Philippines.

200 delegates came together in Bangkok from across 8 Asia Pacific nations – Thailand, China, Japan, Indonesia, Philippines, Singapore, Hong Kong and Australia. There was a wide range of speakers with keynote speakers from the Thailand Royal College of Paediatricians, USA Oregon Health and Science University, China Zhongshan Hospital, and Thailand Ramathibodi Hospital, Siriraj Hospital and Mahidol University, to name a few. Speakers shared their knowledge and expertise in nursing care of neonates, infants, children and adolescents around the theme “Healthy Children for Health World: Challenges for Paediatric Nurses”.

Papers addressed a range of topics including:

- Children's Nursing in Asia Pacific Region
- Primary Health Care
- Public Health
- Sustainable Development Goals (SDG)
- Family Centred Care
- Acute Care and critical care
- Adolescent and young people's health

The conference was presented in English with Day 1 highlights including the Opening Ceremony which took us on a virtual tour of Thailand's heritage, culture, sights and experiences. Thailand's capital Bangkok, is locally referred to as Krung Thep (City of Angels) which is a shortened version of the official Thai name of Krung Thep Maha Nakhon.

Day 1 keynote addresses from Dr Chan Gok Wan and Professor Pipop Jirapinyo called for us to consider the healthcare needs of children across the care continuum and the importance of cooperation between member nations to address the challenges to children's health in the developing countries. Family Centred Care again was a key focus with several speakers describing what Family Centred Care looks like in practice, identifying and addressing the barriers to truly partnering with families in the care of the child.

Day 2 saw common themes from speakers with an emphasis on the importance of pre-conception care and parenting, primary prevention and public health care including promoting, supporting and protecting breastfeeding, increasing childhood immunization uptake, and prevention of infectious diseases.


There was time prior to the meeting to explore some of Bangkok's heritage and cultural highlights with a guided tour of the Grand Palace and temples. Day 3 we were escorted to the Siriraj Hospital – the largest public hospital in Thailand – and a guided tour of the Paediatric Units including PICU's, RICU, CICU, Oncology, Medical and Surgical public and private units.

It was a truly memorable experience and a complete privilege to share the company of the international faculty, to share and learn together in children and young people's nursing.

COMMUNIQUE

CoNNMO Member Meeting – Friday 6 October 2017

Office of the Commonwealth Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer

Liza Edwards, Project Manager gave an update as Debra Thoms was on leave. In late August, Deb accepted the position of First Assistant Secretary for Ageing and Aged Care Services. This is in addition to her role as Commonwealth Chief Nurse and Midwifery Officer (CCNMO). As CCNMO, Deb hosted a 2 day symposium in March on both advanced practice, and registered nurse and midwife prescribing. Two pieces of work following on from the symposium include: developing a national framework to support advanced practice; and exploring the progression of registered nurse and midwife prescribing in Australia. Deb Thoms is currently working with the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia (NMBA) and the Australian and New Zealand Council of Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers (ANZCCNMO) on a discussion paper exploring potential prescribing models for registered nurses and midwives in Australia. The discussion paper will be circulated for public consultation later this month. Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia

Petrina Halloran, Policy Manager gave an update. The NMBA are currently working in association with the Australian and New Zealand Council of Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers (ANZCCNMO) Chief Nurses on prescribing. A working group has been set up with representatives from both groups. They have reviewed the work that came from the advanced practice and registered nurse and midwife prescribing symposium, and drafted a discussion paper looking at the health professional prescribing pathway (HPPP) model, autonomous prescribing, prescribing under supervision and protocol prescribing. An 8 week consultation is being conducted for feedback on the proposed model and planned implementation. The Midwife standards for practice have been reviewed with the final document due to be released April next year. The NMBA is also about to review the national decision making framework. There will be a survey as part of this consultation. The Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) now has a mobile friendly website which is easier for users to navigate. Graduates can also complete the majority of their application for initial registration online. The NMBA is currently calling for applications for appointment to the Committee to oversee the assessment of overseas qualified nurses and midwives. Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council

An update was provided by Fiona Stoker, Chief Executive Officer via teleconference. The Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council (ANMAC) review accreditation standards every 5 years. The ANMAC Registered Nurse Accreditation Standards consultation is currently underway with submissions due 22 October 2017. There is also a survey available online for stakeholders to provide feedback. ANMAC have been looking at the NMC UK model of accreditation services and the framework used by other accreditation councils in Australia, in particular the one used by the Dental Board. Both of these models have five standards. ANMAC may reduce the current number of standards to remove overlap. Any duplication in the standards will be looked at in the course of the RN Accreditation Standards review. ANMAC are updating the website and now have a quarterly newsletter. They are keen for more engagement with stakeholders in order to improve education standards. ANMAC will be seeking expressions of interest for expert advisory groups. The Independent review of accreditation systems within the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (NRAS) for health professions report is now available. CoNNMO members were encouraged to read the governance section and recommendations in the report. Submissions on the report are due 16 October 2017. Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia Codes of Conduct

Petrina Halloran, Policy Manager for the NMBA, presented on the release of the revised Codes of conduct for nurses and midwives. The Board undertook a two year project to review the codes, which now incorporates professional boundaries. The codes of conduct support nurses and midwives in the delivery of safe practice as part of their professional role. They provide guidance for the public about the standard of conduct and behaviour they should expect from nurses and midwives. The codes assist the Board to protect the public by setting and maintaining standards to ensure safe practice. The review of the codes was informed by research, commencing with a comprehensive literature review. Mapping was undertaken against the current codes and a shared code of conduct used by other regulated professions. This was followed by analysis of notifications and complaints to identify key issues to address in the codes. Focus groups were held across the country. Working groups for both nursing and midwifery were established to provide specialist input throughout the review. An 8 week public consultation on the revised codes was undertaken.

The key recommendations that came from the literature review included that the code should: be modelled on those used by the other professions; condense the nursing and midwifery codes into one document; apply to nurses and midwives in both clinical and non-clinical practice; include professional boundaries; use more directive language; and, include guidance on bullying and harassment and use of social media. The NMBA has maintained a separate code for nurses and a code for midwives. Consideration will be given to moving to a joint code with other professions in the future. Australian Digital Health Agency

After addressing CoNNMO earlier this year at the May member meeting, Angela Ryan, General Manager of Clinical Programs at the Australian Digital Health Agency (ADHA) gave an update on activities in recent months. Following consultation, the national digital health strategy is now completed. Four key themes came from the consultation: the health system is difficult to navigate; people would like to access their personal health information on their smart phone (my health app); health care is difficult to access when needed, due to cost, location and availability of appointments; and the top activities consumers want to be able to do on their mobile device is to manage medications, track their health and request refill prescriptions.

Digital health is about giving consumers more control of their health and care, connecting and empowering health care professionals, and bringing together a seamless integrated view of digital health and health care. Having access to information brings enormous benefit to consumers and enables consumers to have more control of their health. The My Health Record is a summary view of a person's health information that can be shared securely on-line between the person and their health care provider to support improved decision-making and continuity of care. Following completion of the My Health Record opt-out trials in Nepean Blue Mountains and Northern Queensland, the opt-out model is now being rolled out to all Australians. The Australian Government has invested \$374.2 million over years to ensure every Australian has a My Health Record, unless they prefer not to. If a person doesn't already have a My Health Record, a record will be automatically created for them in 2018, unless they choose not to have one. The ADHA is currently seeking expressions of interest to participate in their Clinical Reference Leads program. John Peacock, General Manager, Associations Forum facilitated an interactive session on governance of associations, member engagement and growth. John first addressed CoNNMO members over ten years ago when he was engaged to facilitate a Strategic Planning Day to guide the work of the then NNO's. Since then CoNNMO has become a coalition, changed its name and logo, developed a strategic plan, and developed Terms of Reference. John consults with organisations on strategy, governance, board effectiveness, operations, restructuring and financial issues, as well as reviews of associations and charities. John has worked individually with many of the CoNNMO member organisations. John led discussion on the topics using a handout to guide practice. John's handout is available on the CoNNMO website. Patient Safety and Leadership

Carrie Marr, Chief Executive of the NSW Clinical Excellence Commission addressed CoNNMO members on the work of the Commission and the future focus of patient safety. The Commission provides leadership in safety and quality to improve outcomes for patients by developing and driving improvement initiatives in collaboration with consumers, clinicians, managers, and other health service partners. NSW Health have identified five strategic priorities, and nominated patient safety as the top priority. Carrie described some of the international models that are working well. The top five are in Sweden, the United States and the United Kingdom. As organisations, they have created themselves to be proactive and generative, relying on culture not policies and processes. These top organisations' focus on: culture, people, work flow, technology and organisation values. Highly reliable organisations: focus on being predictive and proactive; are open about failures; are not harm free, but harm does not disable them; emphasize learning; are obliged to act; are accountable; have a just culture; believe daily work practices produce safer care; and value teamwork and leadership. MumSpace is suitable for mums-to-be, new mums, their partners and as a resource that healthcare professionals can refer their clients to.

Why a stepped-care approach?

All new parents can benefit from support. Some will require an extra level of support while others will need more intensive treatment and monitoring. A stepped-care approach is a model of mental health care that delivers the level of support and treatment best matched to each person. **MumSpace** uses this model to enable women to decide which supports they want and need, and allows them to step up or step down a level as their needs change.

What is MumMoodBooster?

MumSpace provides access to [MumMoodBooster](#), a new proven effective online cognitive-behavioural therapy treatment program. Available 24/7 and suitable for pregnant and new mums, it is the only e-treatment program of its kind in Australia.

Research studies have shown that women who participate show rapid reductions in symptoms of depression, anxiety and stress. The program includes six online treatment sessions complemented by SMS support and can be accessed from home or mobile.

MindMum New App – Just Released!

This new mobile app supports the emotional wellbeing of mums in the perinatal period. [MindMum](#) offers a convenient and easy tool to help new mums monitor their own mood, progress through self-paced guided activities and step up or down to online tools as needed. Holly is the Executive Officer of Kidsafe SA and has been dedicated to the prevention of unintentional death and serious injury to children for over 12 years. During this time, Holly has led the implementation of many influential child safety strategies which aimed to reduce childhood deaths and serious injuries in South Australia. In addition, Holly has provided significant input into a number of state based child injury prevention forums and Committees including the SA Safe Infant Sleeping Standards Committee since 2009.

With particular interest in safe infant sleeping, low-speed run overs and lithium button battery ingestion, Holly is committed to working collaboratively to address child safety and injury prevention issues with other key agencies and community groups.

Kidsafe SA is the leading independent not-for-profit organisation dedicated to promoting safety and preventing unintentional deaths and serious injuries to children aged 0 - 15 years in South Australia. More children still die of injury in Australia than of cancer, asthma and infectious diseases combined. Many of these deaths and serious injuries can be prevented. Kidsafe exists to prevent these tragedies.

The presentation was overwhelmingly received, and the participants scored the top level in all of the domains. The comments were exceptional for example:
