Engaging with the New Era of Publish or Perish: 'Integrated Knowledge Translation' of Research Insights: An Approach that Ensures Messages Get Out in the right time & to the Right Audiences



Dr Judith Lynam, Professor & Associate Director Strategic Initiatives, Research Lead – RICHER Social Pediatrics Initiative, Programme Director – Master of Health Leadership & Policy, University of British Columbia

The focus of this Master Class is on how to use research knowledge to improve health outcomes, to enhance organizational effectiveness, assist health investments and attract funding. Using the case of the RICHER research programme the class will illustrate how stakeholders in all sectors (clinicians in paediatric clinical centres, community based primary care providers, public health, community based organizations & families) were engaged in the research process and with the approach used to foster the uptake of research insights across contexts of care and disciplines. The RICHER social pediatrics initiative is the most recent example of the way Dr. Lynam brings together the concepts of interest to shape and redefine approaches to professional practice. This intersectoral and interdisciplinary community-based partnership initiative has improved the health of some of Canada's most disadvantaged children and families and serves as an example of ways we may improve healthcare delivery. Key insights that have informed the success of the RICHER initiative recognizes the interdependence of different sectors of healthcare delivery. While children and families receive essential specialized care in tertiary centres, they must manage their health condition in the context of the community with the input and support of community based clinicians. The RICHER team has built relationships along the continuum of care and clinicians work to ensure improved health outcomes. The ongoing evaluation of the clinical work has informed the refinement of approaches to clinical services provision by nurses and physicians in all sectors and created new opportunities for health professional education. This Master Class is an opportunity to interact with a world class researcher from a Clinical Nursing background and make sense of how to pioneer innovative and successful health care and how to share insights and foster dialogue on the most effective ways to design and deliver services. Dr. Lynam has received a number of awards (Dean's Medal, National Korczak Award for Interprofessional Leadership & McCreary Award for Interprofessional Practice). These recognize her expertise as a community engaged scholar who has explored links between health and human rights and leadership in Nursing Education.

RICHER and Effective Interprofessional and Intersectoral Practices

The RICHER Model : Responsive Interdisciplinary Child Health Education and Research Model has created a philosophical basis for care with proven outcomes. At its basis is the Primary Health Initiative underpinned by the knowledge of the Social Determinants of Health. The enablers are the building of relationships, of practitioners with community, of services providers with practitioners and community, of interdisciplinary workers and inter-sectoral program providers. The central point is the children with the knowledge that children are part of a family and community. We are proud to highlight the work of the RICHER Initiative, a little-known but important program of BC Children's Hospital. Established in 2006 the RICHER, or Responsive Intersectoral Child/Community Health Education and Research, Initiative serves vulnerable children and families in Vancouver's inner-city neighbourhoods – specifically Grandview/Woodlands, Strathcona and the Downtown Eastside. There, nurse practitioners, developmental pediatricians, specialists in mental health, dermatology and many others, provide integrated health care to families through community clinics, local schools and social services. Many families, living in those neighbourhoods struggle with poverty and don't benefit from equal access to health care. RICHER's model addresses these families' barriers to care and helps restore their trust in the system. "If you pay attention to the places that children naturally congregate and bring care to venues that families trust, then families will get access to that care. That's proven to be very true in our experience with RICHER," says Lorine Scott (Family Nurse Practitioner), one of RICHER's founding members.

The Voices of Children and Parents as Consumers of Healthcare: An International Perspective

Introduction

During 2016, an international email discussion between nurse academics and clinicians working within paediatrics and child health highlighted a lack of evidence in relation to the conceptual and operational definition, education, practice and research initiatives for child-centred care and family-centred care. This discussion led to the development of the International Network of Child- and Family-Centred Care that currently includes 45 members over 13 countries.

Purpose of the Workshop

To share knowledge on child- and family-centred care research to a forum of paediatric experts to advance knowledge and research on child- and family-centred care from a global perspective.

Method

An international group of paediatric experts from developed and developing countries will present findings on child- and family-centred care from a child, parent or family perspective through webcasts, teleconferencing and face-to-face presence. Innovative research initiatives that aim to advance child- and family-centred care knowledge globally will be presented followed by an open discussion forum.

Conclusion

The purpose of the International Network of Child- and Family-Centred Care is to ensure that child- and family-centred care are tested and implemented effectively through research, scholarship and translation into practice. The international group promotes culturally appropriate education, theory, practice and research, and will make a significant difference in paediatrics and child and young people's health internationally.

Influencing Change in Uncertain Times; Four Rooms and Three Keys



Dr Pam O'Nions, Territory Manager WA/NT, The Health Roundtable

The Four Rooms of Change[®], developed by the Swedish psychologist, Claes Janssen, is a theory that deals with change, with what happens with people and organisations in transition and with how they can influence the change process by taking responsibility for their emotions and actions. This masterclass will explore the dynamics of personal and organisational change by introducing The Four Rooms of Change[®]. Using an interactive approach the group will co-create the theory through their own insights and experiences. The four rooms are then discussed explaining the rooms, the boundaries and the doors, the movement through the rooms and the transitions from one room to the next. Finally the group will explore how the theory of the Four Rooms of Change can apply in a broader system; at the individual, the group and the organisational level.

With over 60 webcasts available for FREE download (members) and for a minimal cost for non-members, this is a great opportunity to access and download those webcasts before they are no longer available.



Patient Blood Management Guidelines

Update – August 2018



The Patient Blood Management (PBM) Guidelines are a series of six modules that focus on evidence-based PBM. Each module has been written for clinicians treating specific patient groups including Critical Bleeding/Massive Transfusion (2011), Perioperative (2012), Medical (2012), Critical Care (2012), Obstetrics and Maternity (2015), and Neonatal and Paediatrics (2016). Electronic versions of the modules and the accompanying Quick Reference Guides are available on the NBA website. Hard copies can also be ordered free of charge, within Australia and New Zealand, via the online order form (www.blood.gov.au/publication-order-form).

UPDATE OF THE PATIENT BLOOD MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES

Now that the suite of modules has been completed, the NBA has turned its attention to maintaining their currency.

The NBA has established a Jurisdictional Blood Committee (JBC) Working Group consisting of government and clinical representatives who are overseeing the process for the project.

A review and update of the Patient Blood Management (PBM) Guidelines is underway.

The research protocol for the review of the current evidence base for the perioperative (Module 2), medical (Module 3), critical care (Module 4), obstetrics and maternity (Module 5) and neonatal and paediatric (Module 6) settings is currently under development. It will be forwarded to all relevant colleges and societies in late 2018 for comment before the literature searches and screening commence.

The review of the evidence base will:

- highlight changes to the evidence since the modules were published
- inform whether the existing themes of the PBM Guidelines should be retained or amended
- inform a research question list

Findings from the review of the evidence base are expected in mid-2019.

The critical bleeding/massive transfusion population (Module 1) has been excluded from this process because the update of Module 1 commenced prior to the decision to review and update all modules together. The Clinical/Consumer Reference Group finalised the research protocol in August 2018 and the systematic review process is now underway. The second edition of Module 1 is expected to be completed in mid-2019. Content from this module will be incorporated or cross-referenced in the updated versions of the other modules, where appropriate.

In a parallel process, the NBA is investigating alternative methodologies to update clinical practice guidelines with the aim of transitioning to a more sustainable process that will allow clinical guidance to be updated as new evidence is published and clinical practice evolves.

The findings and a preferred option for maintaining the currency of the PBM Guidelines will be presented to senior government officials in mid-2019.

While the review is underway, the original modules remain available on the NBA's website to guide practice.

EDUCATION

BloodSafe eLearning Australia (BEA) provides online courses relating to PBM and clinical transfusion practice for health professionals. The courses are available free of charge on www.bloodsafelearning.org.au and include courses on, *Patient Blood Management, Critical Bleeding, Perioperative, Critical Care, Medical and Specialties, Obstetrics and Maternity and Iron Deficiency Anaemia*. A course based on the *PBM Guideline: Module 6 - Neonatal and Paediatrics* has been developed and is now available. Also available in the resource centre are short videos on:

- IV iron administration in primary care
- The perioperative patient – communication and consent
- Minimising blood loss in cardiothoracic surgery
- An overview of patient blood management
- Gastrointestinal bleeding – patient assessment and transfusion.

IMPLEMENTATION ACTIVITIES

To support the implementation of the PBM Guidelines, the NBA facilitates the development of tools and materials to support implementation at a health provider level. A range of tools and materials are available, free of charge [here](#). Tools currently under development will support the implementation of recommendations and practice points in PBM Guidelines Modules 5 and 6.
